BOY'S TOURNAMENT HISTORY

In 1946 the Fighting Irish of Vancouver College defeated Kamloops 34-32 to become the first ever BC High School Boys Basketball Champions. The single tournament format continued until 1969 when a two-tiered format was created based on school enrolment. This is the history of the "AA" tournament (which was originally called the "A" Championship.) as recorded year by year in the tournament summaries.

1975 A poised and well-disciplined team from St. Thomas More won the 6th annual BC Class "A" Championship. Backed by a most vocal home cheer section, the host Knights tamed the Barriere Cougars 76 to 44 in the first round, caged Boundary Central Cougars 73 to 50 in the semi-finals, and shot down the gallant Shawnigan Lake Stags 71 to 68 in the title game. Several records were broken. Don Janzen of Houston erased Shawnigan Lake's Mike Voegtlin's 1974 three game record of 96 points by scoring 97 in the tournament. St. Thomas More created a new high score of 71 points for the championship final and combined with the Stags 68 to establish a new mark of 139 for most points by both teams. When the Shawnigan Lake squad defeated Elphinstone 88 to 74 in the second round, the most points a game record by both teams was raised from 156 to 162.

1976 In the Seventh Annual Class "A" Basketball Tournament played at Hope, St. Thomas More Knights won their second straight provincial championship. Displaying great offensive power and making the most of their extremely good reserved strength, the Knights caged the Fraser Valley Cougars 93-66 in the opening round. Down 14 to 12 at the end of the first quarter in the semi-finals, the 1975 champions raced back to spear the Hazelton Spartans 101 to 59. In the title game the tall and talented Pacers from George Pringle Secondary School in Westbank stayed with the Tri-Zone Champs for the first half. The Knights gradually pulled away in the final quarter to win 87 to 70. The host Hope Mustangs defeated Invermere Lakers 67-41 in their first game, dropped a heartbreaker to Westbank 57 to 55 in the last second of play and beat Hazelton 75 to 52 to take third place.

1977 In the opening game of the Eighth Annual Basketball Tournament played at Vanderhoof, the Oliver Hornets downed the Condors from Duchess Park 92-64. Trailing the Agassiz Chieftains 58 to 54 near the end of the semi-final, the South Okanagan entry scored two field goals to tie the score. The Hornets won the game with a foul shot with one second remaining in regulation time. The Oliver squad then capped a first ever appearance at the "A" Tournament by subduing the Spartans of Hazelton 82 to 73 in the championship final. The Chieftains of Agassiz held off a late challenge by the Boundary Central Roadrunners to take their first round 47 to 45, lost a last second decision to Oliver Hornets 59 to 58, then conquered the Vanderhoof Vikings 62 to 59 to finish in third place.

1978 Twelve schools from various parts of the province participated in the Ninth Annual "A" Boys' Basketball Tournament played at Armstrong. After receiving a bye in the first round, Vanderhoof Vikings advanced to the final by defeating the host Armstrong Chiefs 72 to 67 and the Reynolds Roadrunners, the Vancouver Island champs 79 to 36. The Mustangs from Hope, also with an opening day bye, reached the championship game with victories over Creston Comets 709 to 64 and Revelstoke Mountaineers 64 to 61. A short-handed Hope squad was no match for the Vanderhoof club as the Vikings sailed to an easy 103 to 58 win and their second BC "A" title.

1979 The 12-team 18-game Tenth Annual "A" Tournament was held at George Pringle Secondary School in Westbank. Revelstoke Mountaineers, Prince Charles Comets of Creston, University Hill Hawks and Nishga Bullets of New Aiyansh, qualified from the first round of unseeded teams. These four met Stelly's Stingers of Brentwood Bay, Vancouver Island No. 1, Hope Mustangs, the Fraser Valley champs, Nechako Valley Vikings of Vanderhoof, best in the Northern BC Central and Summerland Rockets, first in the Okanagan, on the second day of competition. All the top seeds except Summerland were toppled. In a most exciting final, Prince Charles Comets won their first provincial crown when they defeated the pre-tournament favorite Rockets 84

to 79. Many team and individual scoring records were broken.

1980 16 teams qualified for the 28 game Eleventh Annual "A" Tournament played at Hope. The well-coached host Mustangs won the BC Title for the second time with consistent strong defence and balanced offense. Of the many new records established, the most outstanding were the single game (50 points) and four-game (134 points) broken by Fabian Teegee of the Fort St. James Falcons.

1981 In the Twelfth Annual "A" Tournament final played at Merritt, Lord Byng Grey Ghosts out scored Dunsmuir Demons 24 -13 in the last quarter to take the "A" title for the first time. Thus the Grey Ghosts became the only school in BC to win both the "A" and "AA" championship.

1982 University Hill Hawks defeated the Westsyde Whundas 86-85 in overtime at a very successful 16-team tournament played at DW Poppy Secondary School. Down 85-80 in the OT, the Hawks scored six straight points, the last two by Jamie Alden with three seconds remaining, to win their first provincial championship.

1983 A most successful 14th Annual BCHSBBBA Tournament was held for the second consecutive year at DW Poppy Secondary School of the Langley District. Pitt Meadows Marauders and Sentinel Spartans. Each ranked near or at the top of the polls for most of the season, met in a most thrilling final. The Marauders qualified for the championship game by mauling the Highland Raiders from Comox (VI #3) 85-42, caging George Pringle Panthers of Westbank (OK #2) 58-56 and shooting down the Hawks of University Hill (LM #1) 74-60. The Spartans advanced to the finals by subduing Kelly Road Roadrunners of Prince George (OD #1) 84-48 and beating the host Pioneers of D.W. Poppy 60-50. The two best "A" teams in BC produced a very exciting title game. With the score tied for the 13th time, Darrell Schott of Pitt Meadows swished a 15 footer from the left corner in the dying seconds to give the Marauders a 59-57 victory and their first Provincial "A" Championship.

1984 the 15th annual "A" tournament was held at Cariboo College in Kamloops and was hosted by Barriere Secondary School. With ten returnees from 1983 sixth place team, D.W. Poppy Pioneers (FV #1) lived up to their number one seeding and won the BC "A" championship for the first time. The Pioneers caged Mount Sentinel Wildcats (Kootenay West #1) 67-43, downed St. Michael's Saints (VI #3) 65-53 and subdued Claremont Raiders (OK #1), competing in the tournament for the first time, advanced to the championship game by taming Houston Wolverines (BC West #1) 84-70, blasting Robron Breakers (VI #2) 67-39, and beating Quesnel Spartans (NBC Central #20) 61-50. The title-game was close until the middle of the 3rd quarter when Poppy led 30-29. The Pioneers then pulled away to take a 62-41 victory.

1985 Pitt meadows Secondary School hosted a very successful "A" Tournament in 1985. The 16th annual basketball classic was most competitive and featured several upsets including Sentinel Spartans' 85-67 victory over the #1 ranked South Okanagan Hornets in game number one. University Hill Hawks thwarted West Vancouver Highlanders bid to be the first school to win both "A" and "AA" championships by defeating the Howe Sound #1 team in the final. With four players scoring in double figures, the Hawks never were headed in the title-game. Leading 22-16 at the quarter, 40-39 at the half, 59-55 at three-quarter time, they added 21 points in the last ten minutes to win 80-72.

1986 Number one ranked Southern Okanagan Hornets, the host school, won their 2nd BC Championship at the 17th Annual "A" Tournament. The high quality of play and sportsmanship displayed by the teams were matched by the hospitality of the Oliver school and community. The 1986 tournament had virtually no upsets, as all but one of the top eight places were taken by ranked teams. Led by 6'8" MVP and first All-Star, Spencer McKay, who averaged 31 points

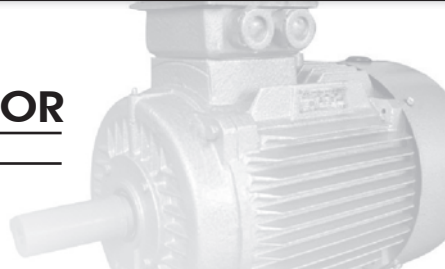

Maroons come close, but Tigers regain the throne

The Vancouver-York House Tigers are back on top of the B.C. AA girls basketball world. The Tigers won their seventh provincial crown Saturday, beating the Vernon-Clarence Fulton Maroons 79-73 in front of a packed house at the Tournament Capital Centre.

York House has been the class of provincial AA girls basketball since the championship moved to Kamloops in 1999, winning seven titles and making the final three other times. But it had been four years since the Tigers last won a banner, and head coach Winston Brown was starting to question his work.

"The first one we won, I didn't realize what we were in for," Brown said. "When we started winning them, we were taking them for granted."

"But then we lost three, and we started to second-guess ourselves, but to win here re-affirms everything we're doing."

The victory in the final was the closest to York House since 1999, when it beat the Vancouver-Little Flower-Academy Angels 70-66 at the side Coliseum. The Tigers won the previous three finals...

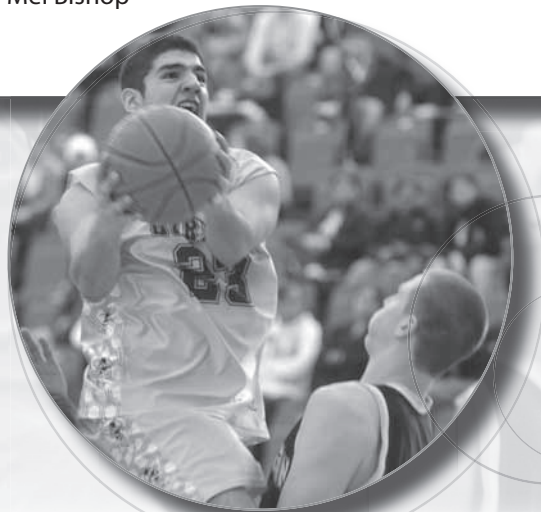
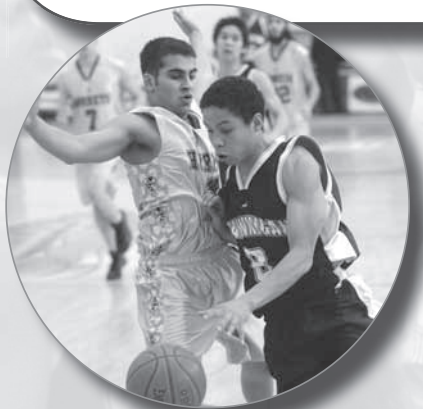

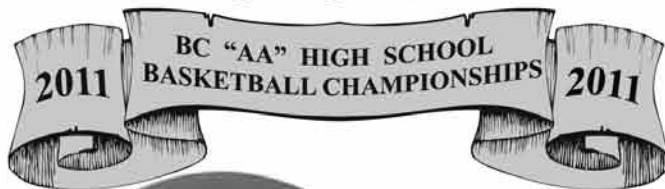

The Thompson Rivers University WolfPack basketball programs are proud to be associated with the annual BC "AA" boys and girls basketball championships. A number of former and current members of the WolfPack players and coaches have participated in the tourney.

Current WolfPack women's head coach, Scott Reeves has scouted the tournament for a number of years as he looks for players to move into his CIS program. Current WolfPack players: Diane Schuetze (Vernon), Kailey Colonna (Invermere), Jessica Mulock (North Vancouver BC) and red shirt Emi Ohama (Kamloops, BC) all participated in the tourney. Reeves, himself, coached in the tournament when he was teaching secondary school in Aldergrove. His squads finished fourth both years he was here.

Colonna says she loved every minute of playing in the tournament (06-07). "My team played every year for the right to come here," she remembers "I know that the other girls on my team (TRU) played for higher goals in bigger schools, but mine (David Thompson) just making it to the provincials was a big deal". Since the tourney is at the end of the line for many high school careers, Kamloops has a special place in Kailey's heart. "To play my final high school game and start my university career here means a lot to me". Adding that she thought she was going to play college ball in Alberta until WolfPack assistant coach Chuck Ferguson watched her first game at the provincials. "He assured me

that the girls were great and they could be a place for me. I owe him a lot for that. And it ended up to me what I was looking for".

Ohama is the most recent WolfPack women's player to participate in the tournament. She was a member of the Sahali Sabres who finished tenth in 2007-08 and fifth in 2008-09. "I really liked having the provincials in Kamloops," she said. "It made it really easy for my family, friends and past coaches to make it to all our games. It made the provincial experience all the more special."

The Wolfpack men's basketball team has a number of players who have participated in this tournament. This includes forward Conor Agnew (2004-06 as a member of the Prince Rupert Rainmakers), Charles Barton (Vernon, BC), Travis Beck (Vernon, BC), and Hudson Naylor (Sahali, Kamloops, BC). Naylor participated in the tournament from 2006-08 with Sahali. His best finish was in 2007 when they came fourth. "It was so much fun player before friends and family," he says. "My last tourney was especially sweet because I got recruited to TRU."

Most noteworthy is graduating guard Sean Garvey (Kamloops, BC). He played in the tournament twice as a member of the Westsyde Whundas (2000-01) and coached in the last three tournaments (2007, 2008, 2009) with the Sahali Sabres.



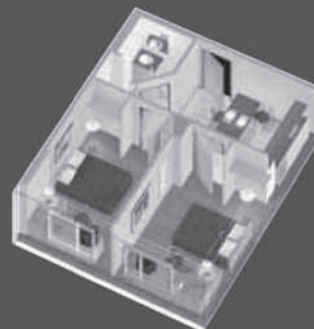

per game including 36 in the final, the Oliver Hornets joined the ranks of the double winners with their first Provincial "A" Title since 1977.

1987 Playing in their first "A" Tournament and on their home court, the Cariboo Hill Chargers upheld a number 1 ranking by winning the BC crown at the 18th Annual BCHSBBA Championships. The 1987 tournament featured many close games as two of the top seeded teams lost in their first round. With no dominant school competing, a majority of the 28 match-ups were very close and demonstrated the improvement of the caliber of "A" basketball in all areas of the province.

1988 The Agassiz Chieftains scored 18 unanswered points in the final 5 minutes to defeat Cariboo Hill Chargers, the defending champions, 67-60 in the 19th Annual BCHSBBA "A" Tournament played at Clarence Fulton School in Vernon. The Chargers led 60-49 and appeared to be on their way to a second provincial title before collapsing late in the fourth quarter. The Chieftains come-from-behind victory earned them their first BC "A" Championship.

1989 The Agassiz Chieftains joined Grand Forks Wolves (1970 and 1971) and Saint Thomas More Knights (1975 and 1976) as back-to-back champions when they won their second consecutive title at the 29th Annual BCHSBBA Tournament played at Aldergrove and DW Poppy Schools.

1990 The Lambrick Park Lions, led by 6'8" Brendan Graves, defeated Agassiz Chieftains, the defending champions, 71-70 to win the 21st Annual "AA" Tournament played at Spring Valley Secondary School in Kelowna. The 47 points scored in the final game by Chieftain David Dyck, the MVP, including 39 from 13 three-pointers.

1991 The 22nd Annual BCHSBBA Basketball Tournament for "AA" double schools was played on Vancouver Island for the first time. Host Lambrick Park Lions, led by Brendan Graves with 50 points in the final, lost to George Elliott Dominoes from Winfield 98-79. MVP Andre Thomas of the Dominoes scored 49, including 7 threes, in the championship game, to give the Okanagan reps their first BC title. Greg Devries of LV Rogers with 195 points, including 61 against St. Georges, broke the former record by 54.

1992 The BCHSBBA Basketball Tournament for "AA" schools proved to be the most successful ever. The 23rd Annual was played at Trinity Western University and provided an all-Fraser Valley final. The keen rivalry between DW Poppy Red Hawks and Agassiz Chieftains produced record crowds and gate receipts. The inspired play of MVP, David Buchanan, and balanced team effort enabled the Red Hawks to win their second "AA" title with a 72-57 victory over the Agassiz Chieftains in the championship game.

1993 The 24th Annual BCHSBBA Basketball Tournament for schools with a total male population of 200 or less in grade 11 and 12 was played at Walnut Grove Secondary School in Langley. Carihi Tyees from Campbell River, led by 6'5" Eric Hinrichsen, proved too strong for the Ladysmith 49'ers in the all-Vancouver Island final and won their first "AA" championship with an impressive 85-62 victory.

1994 Two teams from the same zone met in final to decide the BCHSBBA "A" championship. The 25th Annual tournament was played at Trinity Western University. Before a capacity crowd, Aldergrove Totems defeated DW Poppy Red Hawks 65-56 to win their first provincial title.

1995 This was a special year for "AA" basketball, Aldergrove joined Grand Forks, St. Thomas More and Agassiz to become the third team to win back-to-back titles. Neil Brown added his name to the list with coach Rick Goulet and Al Dergousoff to achieve the honor. Aldergrove dominated the hoop scene all season #1 and defeated #1 "AAA" ranked Richmond Colts 81-77. The final game was also a repeat of the 1994 championship matching DW Poppy Red Hawks and Aldergrove. With six minutes remaining the hard fought contest

was tied 62-62. Aldergrove finished with a strong defensive effort and the score was 82-62 when the final buzzer rang. Randy Nohr from the Totems was named MVP.

1996 Once again Glenn Whittington and his committee did a fabulous job organizing a first rate tournament at Trinity Western University. The tournament was wide open as two of the top teams, Duchess Park and College Heights were eliminated by Nechako Valley in the qualifying tournament. On the opening day the Gulf Island team gave the #1 ranked team from Vanderhoof a scare, but by Friday night four of the top five teams advanced to the semi finals. In the one semi final game, a very snappy Saint Patrick's team pressed and ran for 40 minutes, but was finally worn out by a hot Nechako Valley team. In the other contest Holy Cross and Lambrick Park provided the packed gym with tremendous entertainment as Holy Cross won in overtime. The final was set, the #1 ranked Nechako Valley vs. the #3 ranked Holy Cross Crusaders. No one thought that more excitement could be provided them than the previous night, but they were all wrong. These two teams played almost flawless basketball with Nechako Valley edging out a victory in over time 77 to 73.

1997 Lambrick Park, under head coach Ed Somers, returned to the victory stand as champions in 1997, matching coach Somers victory of 1990. Led by tournament Most Valuable Player, Steve Swonnell and first team All Star, Steve Ross, Lambrick Park held their opponents to an average 55 points per game, while scoring an average of 89 points per game. They overwhelmed David Thompson 112-53 in the opening round, beat Reynolds 89-52 in the quarter final, won against Saint Patrick's 80-64 in the semi final game and outscored College Heights 78-53 in the final.

1998 Was the year of the Rainmakers and also marked the second year of hosting by Kelowna and O.U.C. Justin Adams, tournament MVP and first team all star for the second consecutive year, led the Rainmakers to the title with an 81-62 victory over J.L. Crowe Hawks. Colin Yates of Prince Rupert joined Justin Adams on the first All-Star team, while J.L. Crowe placed John Boateng on the 2nd team and did not go home empty handed as they took home the steelhead trophy most sportsmanlike team award.

1999 The "AA" tournament moved to Kamloops and the Riverside Coliseum and U.C.C. as venues. J.L. Crowe Hawks moved from bridesmaids to champions and victories over King George 58-42, DW Poppy in overtime 96-90 and Aldergrove 77-58 moved them to the final against Thomas Aquinas who dispatched George Elliott 76-54, Nechako Valley 82-77 and Clearwater 77-76 with a buzzer beater. Dan Coledi tournament MVP, provided steady leadership throughout the tournament for J.L. Crowe and not allowing Aquinas to get untracked in the final, Crowe prevailed 61-52. J.L. Crowe also took home the steelhead trophy for most sportsmanlike team for the second year in a row while John Boateng of Crowe moved to the first All-Star team from his 2nd team position in 1998.

2000 The second year at Riverside Coliseum and University College of the Cariboo in Kamloops was capped off by St. Thomas Aquinas who defeated Ladysmith 49'ers in the championship game 65-48. St. Thomas, returning as 2nd place finishers in 1999, was determined to surpass their previous performance. Captains Ryan Lee and Sean Thistle led their team with 16 and 18 points respectively. On the road to the final, Ladysmith overpowered the defending champions J.L. Crowe 61-46. Jeremy McCulloch led the 49'ers with 26 points and continued to impress the vocal Ladysmith fans with 21 points in the final game. Sean Thistle joined the elite group of players who have made the 1st All-Star team two consecutive years. He was also named tournament MVP.

2001 Kamloops, Sport Mart Place and the University College of the Cariboo again played host to the "AA" Provincial Championships. Prince Rupert Rainmakers defeated Nechako Valley 91-84 led by Brody Bishop with 25 and 24 from Jason Alsop while tourney MVP Evan Ludwick had 23. Brad Van Dolah led Nechako scoring with a

game high 37 while Aaron Groslliam added 19. On the road to the final Prince Rupert defeated Brocklehurst Broncs 78-47, Ladysmith 49'ers in one of the highest scoring games in tournament history 105-99 and Duchess Park Condors in the Thursday night semi-final. Nechako Valley reached the final with wins over Fraser Valley Christian 97-68, Gulf Island Scorpions and Summerland Rockets 102-82.

2002 Sport mart place again played host to the "AA" tournament final. In your face defence down low and overall team speed allowed Victoria's Lambrick Park Lions to race past number one seed Nechako Valley Vikings 77-57. The game was tied 11-11 at the quarter and was still close at the half, with Lambrick Park up 35-31, but a run of ten straight points midway in the third quarter made for a critical swing, keyed by two base-line three pointers by Lambrick sniper Steve Moore. Lambrick just had more offensive weapons on that night, combined with the fact that Nechako seldom successfully found their 6'9" inside power Tylor Hynd, who had just four points and a single field goal in the second half. Regulated by a perimeter attack only, Lambrick had Nechako outnumbered, and in turn used their team speed to create considerable havoc inside, at both ends of the court. Neither team was in any kind of foul trouble as the officials let the players settle the issue. Moore settled for a game high 37 points, while Keenan Cross hit four three-pointers in a 20-point game. Nechako's Brad VanDolah, a 2001 first team all-star, saw his team finish second best for the second year running, although he poured in 32 points to lead his team, while Tylor Hynd finished with 13. Lambrick Park lions reached the final game with victories over Chatalech 104-60, Sa-hali 65-60 and Fraser Valley Christian 83-54.

2003 Victoria Lambrick Park Lions and Ladysmith 49'ers did battle all season in their Vancouver Island region with every game a close test. Lambrick Park avenged a zone final loss to Ladysmith at the B.C. Championship and defended their B.C title, as Grant Fedorak hit for 30 points in the final game and Rajan Nirwan added 17 points, with guard Mike Sanders pulling 14 rebounds. Ladysmith senior post Mark Darbyshire led his team with 24, with Jaret Radford getting 11 and Phil Cowley 13. 49'ers Jaret Radford had 17 rebounds and 10 assists as well. Lambrick Park jumped to a quick 8-0 lead in the game and led 17-11, 33-28 and 52-43 on the quarters, but at one stage of the fourth quarter had just a three-point advantage. Ladysmith advanced to the final by way of victories over the Windsor Dukes 98-69, the St. Thomas More Knights 59-53 and College Heights of Prince George 90-53 while Lambrick Park advanced to the final by disposing of Steveston Packers 80-63, David Thompson of Invermere and Westsyde of Kamloops 88-52. This victory moved Ed Somers to a spot alone in the record book with 4 final victories in the five final appearances in the Championship.

2004 Better all-around balance especially offensively enabled Lambrick Park Lions to three-peat and continue their season dominance of a Nanaimo Cedar squad. Nanaimo defeated some very good teams in the tough Island Zone, but could not seem to figure out a Lambrick Park team that was top seeded in the Province for much of the season. In the final loss, Cedar big man, Will Galick, did not have the supporting cast to match up with the lions and only three Cedar players scored field goals. Lambrick led 31-14 after one quarter and held a 31-19 advantage at half. They were never seriously challenged with the senior Raj Nirwan pouring in 14 first quarter points including four treys. Senior Mike Saunders, along with senior Lee Yakubowich sizzled early in the third quarter as Lambrick made another serious scoring run. Yakubowich finished the game with game high 27 points and a game end saw five Lambrick players in double figures. Will Galick led Cedar with 23 and a cleanly played wide open game saw just 21 fouls called. Cedar's road to the final saw them defeat Windsor 103-87, Prince Rupert 71-59, and Ladysmith 55-51 while Lambrick got by J.L. Crowe 90-46, Duchess Park 82-52 and Notre Dame 83-67. Coach Somers continues to rewrite the record books as he collects a fifth Championship in six appearances at the "AA" Boy's Provincial Tournament.

2005 The 2005 edition of the Provincial "AA" Boy's Basketball Championship was hosted by the University College of the Cariboo and featured Lambrick Park Lions team with a record five Provincial Titles in the 35 year history of the "AA" Tournament, matched up against their Vancouver Island rival Cedar Spartans of Nanaimo, a repeat of the 2004 final. However, new history was made in 2005 as the Spartans captured their first ever crown led my repeat Most Valuable Player Will Galick. Galick scored 30 points against defending champion Lambrick as Spartans led by four to eight points for most of the second half 78-68 outcome. Besides Galick perimeter shooter Siggie Skagfeld had 25 points including 4 treys and 7/8 foul shooting. For Lambrick big man Jeff Krawetz had 21 and senior guard Charlie Spurr had 20. Lambrick trailed 22-20 at quarter, 25-21 at half and added just 27 more points in a surprisingly low scoring second half but Lions could not capitalize on the fact that the Spartan offense also slowed in the second half. The Lions road to the final included wins over Chatelek 87-67, D.P. Todd 105-69 and Ladysmith 89-69, Valleyview 75-60 and Clarence Fulton 65-58.

2006 Duchess Park Condors took the 2006 "AA" Championship by storm, capturing the Championship, the Spirit Award and the Most Sportsmanlike Team Award during the eighth year of the tournament being hosted in Kamloops' Interior Savings Center and Thompson Rivers University. Prince George and Ladysmith met in the 2006 final, both teams living up to their early tournament rankings. Ladysmith did lead 18-15 after a quarter but were down 34-33 at the half, and 60-54 entering the fourth quarter. Chris Vanderweide led Ladysmith with a game high 36 points. Gabe Hamilton and Jackson Blondeau each scored 16 but Duchess showed a better balanced offense to nail down the win as five players hit double figures, paced by senior guard Matthew Foster with 19 and Nathan Yu with 17. Ladysmith's road to the final went through DP Todd 81-53, LV Rogers 58-42 and Prince Rupert 72-58 while Duchess Park bested Britannia 107-62, Fulton 88-73 and St. Thomas More 86-70 en route to their destiny.

2007 Spectators got to see a first in the history of the BC "AA" High School Basketball Championships...overtime in both final games. The Lambrick Park Lions were also seeking to join the Lambrick Park Pride Girls' team in the first ever one-school sweep of both finals, but it was denied by arch rival Ladysmith 49ers in a low scoring defensive final. Ladysmith led 22-20 at the half and appeared to have control of the game 43-27 early in the final quarter. Lambrick Park chewed away at the lead and outscored Ladysmith 20-9 in the final ten minutes of regulation, capped off with a Josh Ready three pointer with seconds left on the clock. This came just moments after Dylan Borgerson had fouled out and Lambrick seemed to have the advantage moving into overtime. However, Spencer Fyfe-Wilson, inspite of being held to just ten in regulation, popped home six critical points to break the 47-47 regulation tie. Dylan Borgerson had 31 points of the 47 in regulation for Ladysmith while Lambrick Park got 14 from Tyler Christiansen, ten from Eric Howie and 13 from Josh Ready, who finished regulation with the typing hoop and a first half ending mid-court buzzer-beater 3 point bomb. Lambrick Park's road to the final included wins over Armstrong's Pleasant Valley 59-55, LV Rogers of Nelson 73-64 and Prince Rupert Rainmakers 69-57. Ladysmith's journey to the mountaintop included victories over Mission 73-49, Prince George's Duchess Park 75-58 and Sahali of Kamloops 51-50.

2008 Britannia Bruins, a school that had never had a top six finish at the Provincial "AA" Basketball Championships, hit the jackpot in 2008, culminating with a final game win over Windsor Dukes, who were also looking for a first ever "AA" title. Britannia trailed 18-14 at the quarter, led 32-31 at the half, trailed again 58-54 at the 30-minute mark and finally won the see-saw game that featured a separation between teams of just one hoop for much of the fourth quarter. Key man down the stretch was senior perimeter William Edwards with a critical three in the final 8 seconds to put his team up by six and force the Dukes into a series of fouls that did not pay any dividends as the

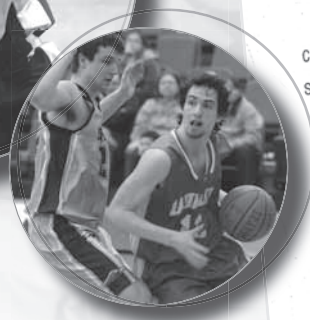

Windsor's road to the final went through South Okanagan 94-79, Esquimalt 83-76 and Fulton 75-55, while Britannia bested Ladysmith 78-54, Mark Isfeld 77-66 and Nechako Valley 63-54.

2009 Featured a Southern Okanagan team ranked #1, attempting to win an "AA" Championship last accomplished by an earlier Southern Okanagan team in 1986. The 2009 opponent Britannia was attempting to win a second consecutive championship in their third appearance in the Tournament. In many ways this was a match-up of point guards, Britannia star Jesse Kootenay-Jobin and Hornets Jaspreet Gill, although a host of other players also stepped to the fore in blazing streaks of points. There were the inside baskets of Osato Obaseki for Britannia, and for Oliver the inside precision of unsung hero Jordan Thomson. Once again, top seeded South Okanagan got into a high-powered offensive tilt, down 21-20 after a quarter, leading 44-41 at the half, back behind 71-64 after three quarters, then battling back to claw out a win in a super tense finish. For the Hornets, Jas Gill led with 19 points, took possession of the defensive boards and had a wealth of assists. For Britannia, Osato Obaseki had 19, guard Semir Ibrahim led all scorers in the game with 30, Jesse Kootenay-Jobin had 22 and Kevin Greer 15. Oliver got a big second half from Vikram Sidhu with 25, while Jordan Thomson had 21 and Gurb Gil 17. Britannia's road to the final included wins over Fulton 81-63, St. Patrick's 77-69

and Ladysmith 62-58. South Okanagan dispatched Thomas Haney 99-73, DP Todd 105-65 and Southridge Storm 109-101 in a game that set two new Tournament Records of Highest Losing Score and Highest Score Both Teams. As well, Britannia and Southern Okanagan set a new record for total points in a final game. Southern Okanagan set additional records of Most Points during Tournament by a team and Most Points per game average.

2010 Final Game was a replay of the Lower Mainland Zone Playoff but the result saw the Britannia Bruins being crowned as B.C. Champs. Britannia completed the task in the same convincing fashion that the Griffins had executed on them. The two Vancouver schools played to a near packed house at Thompson Rivers University. The Bruins broke the back of their opponents by racing to a 27-11 lead in the first quarter, behind a three point barrage that saw five treys, three by Britannia's captain, senior guard Wayne Hoang with 11 points in the quarter and 16 for the game. Osato Obaseki led the Bruins with 17 and Carl Sheng added 11 as did William Ramirez, while Gerard Ogonzales notched three early treys for his nine points, to also help spark the fast start. Tournament MVP Semir Ibrahim also had 12 in the win. The Griffins never got their potent lightning quick offense untracked with point guard Billy Cheng limited to five points, leaving Maziar Arimandi with 14 and 13 each from Mike Zayas and Ranjodh Hare. The win for Britannia was their second as they duplicated their win in 2008. Besides Semir Ibrahim, all-star selections from the tourney final, included Osato Obaseki from Britannia and Palmer guard Billy Cheng. RC Palmer's road to the final included wins over Princess Margaret 80-48, Sahali 79-64 and Clarence Fulton 96-86, while Britannia's date with destiny included victories over Holy Cross 67-59, Southern Okanagan 79-62 and G W Graham 70-52.

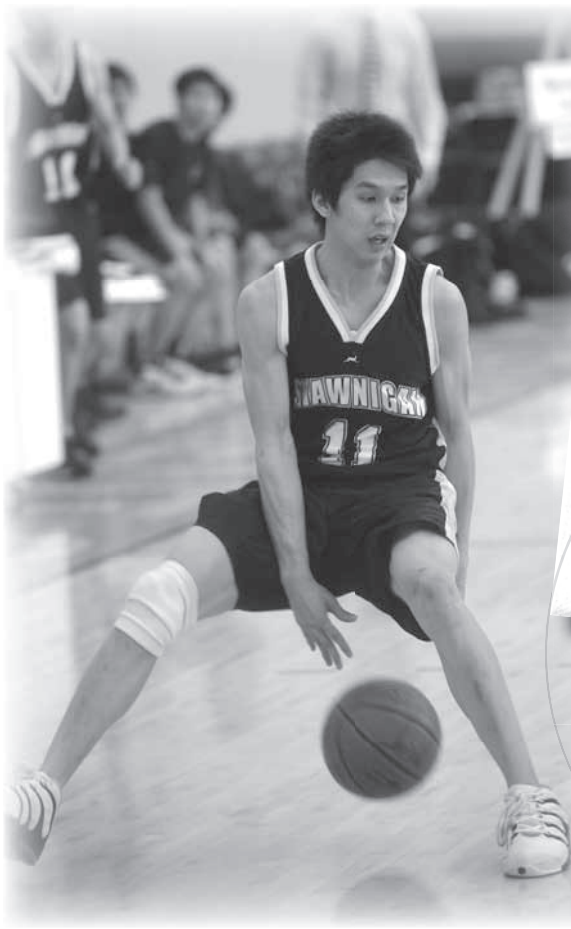
The Sa-Hali Sabres senior boys basketball team needed everything to go perfectly Thursday.

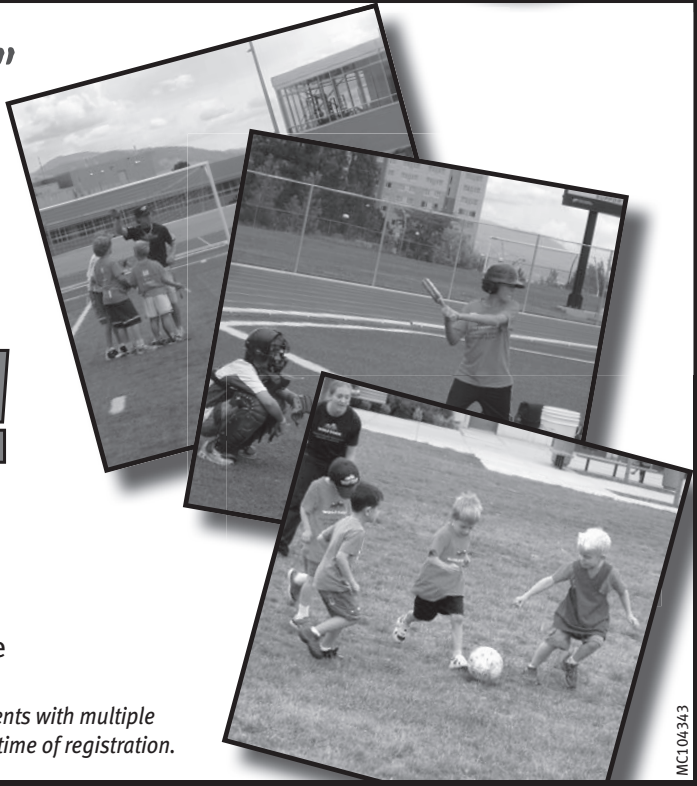
